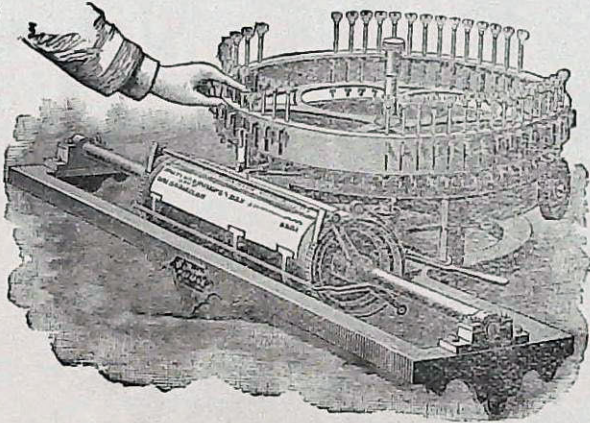


# The Past, Present, and Future of Writing-machines.

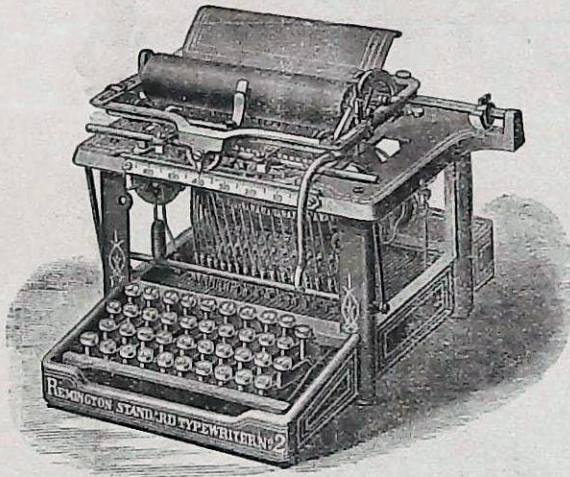
## The Past :
